DCNR: GRANT FUNDING FOR ATV OR SNOWMOBILE TRAIL PROJECTS AND **PROGRAMS**

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources made grant funding available for projects proposing land acquisition, planning, development, rehabilitation, maintenance, equipment purchase or educational programs for all-terrain vehicle (ATV) or snowmobile trails.



SB 45 Ward, Kim(R) (PN 21) Amends the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission Act further providing for emergency vehicles by waiving fees for a member of the Pennsylvania State Police for a legitimate law enforcement function and a vehicle carrying or escorting a firefighter, ambulance service or rescue squad member, law enforcement officer or armed service member killed in the line of duty. Effective in 60 days.

SB 54 Williams, Anthony(D) (PN 27) The Jayanna Powell Hit-and-Run Direct Notification Act requires the Department of Transportation to develop and maintain a system that compiles information regarding vehicles that have fled the scene of a motor vehicle accident to notify motor vehicle repair facilities. In addition, after a hit-andrun accident resulting in bodily injury or death, the investigating law enforcement agency shall directly notify all motor vehicle facilities in the commonwealth via the system. Further provides for the information to be included on the system. Also requires a motor vehicle repair facility to register with the department and for duty to report. Effective in 30 days.

SB 55 Williams, Anthony(D)

(PN 28) Amends the Pennsylvania Amber Alert System Law adding a new subsection requiring the Pennsylvania State Police to establish and maintain the Jay Alert System to assist in the identification and apprehension of suspects who leave the scene of an accident which results in serious bodily injury or death. The system shall be operated by the State Police and activation of the system may be requested by law enforcement agencies when public assistance is considered expedient to the identification and apprehension of a motor vehicle operator who has fled the scene. Effective in 60 days.

SB 62 Ward, Judy (F)(R)

(PN 34) Amends Title 75 (Vehicles), in registration of vehicles, further providing for veteran plates and placard. The bill establishes that a veteran whose service-connected disability is certified at 75 percent or greater, previously 100 percent, shall be issued a special registration plate designating the vehicle as belonging to a severely disabled veteran. Effective in 60 days.
